Lesson Plan

1. Theme: Me and the Society: Society, Community, Participation, and Shared Responsibility

Social Structures – Community Life – Responsibility – Cooperation – Intercultural Coexistence – Active Citizenship

2. Grade: 6th Grade

3. Target Group: Students studying in a Greek primary school within a multicultural classroom, including students of Islamic background, with diverse cultural and social experiences.

4. Lesson Type

Lesson for: acquiring social and civic knowledge, understanding how societies and communities function, developing responsibility, cooperation, and participation skills, strengthening intercultural understanding and respectful coexistence.

5. Duration: 45 minutes

6. Basic Terms: society, community, citizen, participation, responsibility, cooperation, rules, rights, duties, diversity, inclusion, solidarity, common good, respect, dialogue

7. Pedagogical Methods

Guided and structured discussion

Inquiry-based learning

Case-based learning (community examples)

Educational Goals

Students will learn to:

- ✓ Identify roles of people in a community
- ✓ Understand why rules and cooperation are necessary
- ✓ Recognize diversity as a social reality

11. Expected Results

By the end of the lesson, students will be able to:

- ✓ Explain what society and community mean in their own words
- ✓ Give examples of cooperation in community life
- ✓ Describe responsibilities of community members
- ✓ Explain why diversity exists in societies
- ✓ Show respectful attitudes toward others in group interactions

13. Structure of the Lesson

A. Introduction – Activating Prior Knowledge (6 minutes)

Teacher questions:

What is a community?

Which communities are you part of? (family, school, neighborhood)

Why do people need rules to live together?

Transition:

“Today we will learn how societies and communities work, and what responsibilities we have as members of them.”

14. Core Concepts – Theoretical Content

Information for the Teacher

a) Society and Community

A society is a large group of people who live together and organize their lives through shared rules, values, and institutions. Societies include many different communities.

A community is a smaller social group where people interact more directly, such as a school, neighborhood, or local area. Communities depend on cooperation, communication, and shared responsibility.

Societies function well when people understand that they are connected and that their actions affect others.

b) Roles, Rules, and Responsibility

Every society has rules that help people live together peacefully. Rules exist to protect people's rights and ensure fairness.

Responsibility means: following rules, respecting others, contributing to the common good.

Students at this age begin to understand that responsibility is not only personal, but also social.

c) Cooperation and Participation

Cooperation means working together to achieve shared goals. Participation means being involved in community life, expressing opinions respectfully, and helping solve common problems.

Active participation strengthens democracy and social trust. Even children can participate by:

respecting rules, helping others, expressing ideas peacefully, working in groups.

d) Diversity and Inclusion

Modern societies are diverse. People may differ in: culture, language, traditions, family backgrounds.

Diversity is a natural characteristic of societies. Inclusion means ensuring that everyone feels respected and valued, regardless of differences. Understanding diversity helps prevent exclusion, discrimination, and conflict.

e) Intercultural Perspective

In multicultural societies, people may have different customs, but they often share common values such as: respect, cooperation, fairness, responsibility toward others.

In Greek society and in many cultural traditions, community life has always depended on cooperation and mutual support.

Teacher's Role

The teacher acts as: facilitator of dialogue, model of respectful behavior, guide in ethical reflection, mediator in discussions.

15. Practical Activities & Timeline

1. Case Discussion – “Life in a Community” (8 minutes)

Students read a short scenario about a neighborhood problem.

Scenario 1: The Shared Playground

Situation

In a neighborhood, there is a small public playground used by many children. Some children play football there every afternoon, while younger children and elderly people also want to use the space to rest or play quietly. Recently, problems have started. The football often goes near the benches, and elderly people feel unsafe. Some parents complain, and the children begin to argue with each other.

Guiding Questions:

What is the main problem in this community?

Who is responsible for the situation? (children, parents, community, everyone?)

How could the children, parents, and neighbors cooperate to use the playground peacefully?

What rules or agreements could help everyone feel safe and respected?

Key Ideas for Discussion

Shared spaces belong to everyone

Different needs must be respected

Cooperation and dialogue help solve community problems

Scenario 2: Noise in the Apartment Building

Situation

In an apartment building, families from different backgrounds live together. Some families like to play music or watch television loudly in the evening. Other neighbors, including elderly people and students, feel disturbed and cannot rest or study. Instead of talking to each other, some neighbors leave angry notes in the hallway. Tension begins to grow in the building.

Guiding Questions:

What problem has appeared in this community?

How do the actions of some people affect others?

Who should take responsibility for solving the problem?

How can dialogue and cooperation improve life in the building?

Key Ideas for Discussion

Respecting shared living spaces

Understanding different habits and needs

Communication as a tool for peaceful coexistence

2. Group Activity – “Community Roles” (10 minutes)

Groups identify:

different community roles,

responsibilities of each role,

how cooperation helps.

3. Reflection Circle (5 minutes)

Sentence starters:

“A community works well when...”

“I am responsible for...”

“Respect in society means...”

16. Final Teacher Reflection

After the lesson, reflect on: students' understanding of society and responsibility, ability to cooperate and listen, respect for diversity, level of participation and engagement.
